


# Hate speech in a nutshell


The term hate speech is understood as any kind of communication in speech, writing or behaviour, that attacks or uses pejorative or discriminatory language with reference to a person or a group on the basis of who they are, in other words, based on their religion, ethnicity, nationality, race, colour, descent, gender or other identity factor. This is often rooted in, and generates intolerance and hatred and, in certain contexts, can be demeaning and divisive.




### Hate Speech includes:

- Humiliation
- Statements that promote vicious stereotypes
- Speech intended to incite hatred and violence against a group
- May include nonverbal representations and symbols








While all hate speech is potentially dangerous, not all hate speech is equally dangerous. It is important to recognize its diverse forms and degrees, as well as to consider its broader societal context.

Hateful comment posted by a user in a small, closed group will not have the same impact as a comment shared by a politician with thousands of followers



### Facebook

Facebook defines hate speech as a direct attack against people on the basis of what they call protected characteristics. Facebook defines attacks as violent or dehumanizing speech, harmful stereotypes, statements of inferiority, expressions of contempt, disgust or dismissal, cursing, and calls for exclusion or segregation.



Tier 1: violent speech, dehumanizing speech, mocking hate crimes

Tier 2: statements of inferiority, physical, mental, or moral deficiency, expressing contempt or disgust

Tier 3: calls to exclude or segregate, use of slur



#### Twitter

You may not promote violence against or directly attack or threaten other people on the basis of certain characteristics. You may not use hateful images or symbols in your profile image or profile header. You also may not use your username, display name, or profile bio to engage in abusive behavior, such as targeted harassment or expressing hate towards a person, group, or protected category.

Violent threats


References to mass murder, violent events, or specific means of violence where protected groups have been the primary targets or victims


Repeated and/or non-consensual slurs, epithets, racist and sexist tropes, or other content that degrades someone

Wishing, hoping or calling for serious harm on a person or group of people

Incitement against protected categories
